Arden Earl French Captain, U.S. Army Air Corps

Arden Earl French grew up and was educated in the area of Stewardson, Illinois. Earl completed two years of college at Eastern Illinois State Teachers College and started teaching school around Stewardson. With the U.S. involvement in WWII looming, Earl enlisted in the U.S. Army Infantry on June 20, 1941, in Chicago, Illinois. On February 14, 1942, he became an aviation cadet in the U.S. Army Air Corps. On August 15, 1942, Earl was commissioned a 2nd Lieutenant in the Air Corps, Air Transport Command, and 643 South Atlantic Ferrying Wing as a navigator.

Earl was first sent to Natal, Brazil, December 3, 1942, from where he flew repeated missions to North Africa and the Middle East as far as Iran. On April 7, 1943, Earl was made 1st Lieutenant and December 2, 1943 he was made Captain. In August

1944, on a mission to Paraguay, Earl was awarded the Legion of Merit, Officer Class, by the Paraguay government.

In December 1944, Earl's overseas duty was to have been over. Upon returning to the U.S. and expecting continued U.S. service, Earl

married Louann
Engel, also of
Stewardson, on
December 28,
1944. However, in
early April 1945,
Earl was sent back
to Natal and a few
weeks later he
learned that



Louann was pregnant with their first child. On June 9, 1945, after repeated delays of a mission to England due to mechanical problems with his plane, Earl's B-24 crashed on take-off from Natal, killing all five on board. On November 1, 1945, Earl's son was born.
